Trying to always see how our actions affect others rather than ourselves



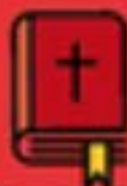
Altruism

‘Blessed are the peacemakers’.



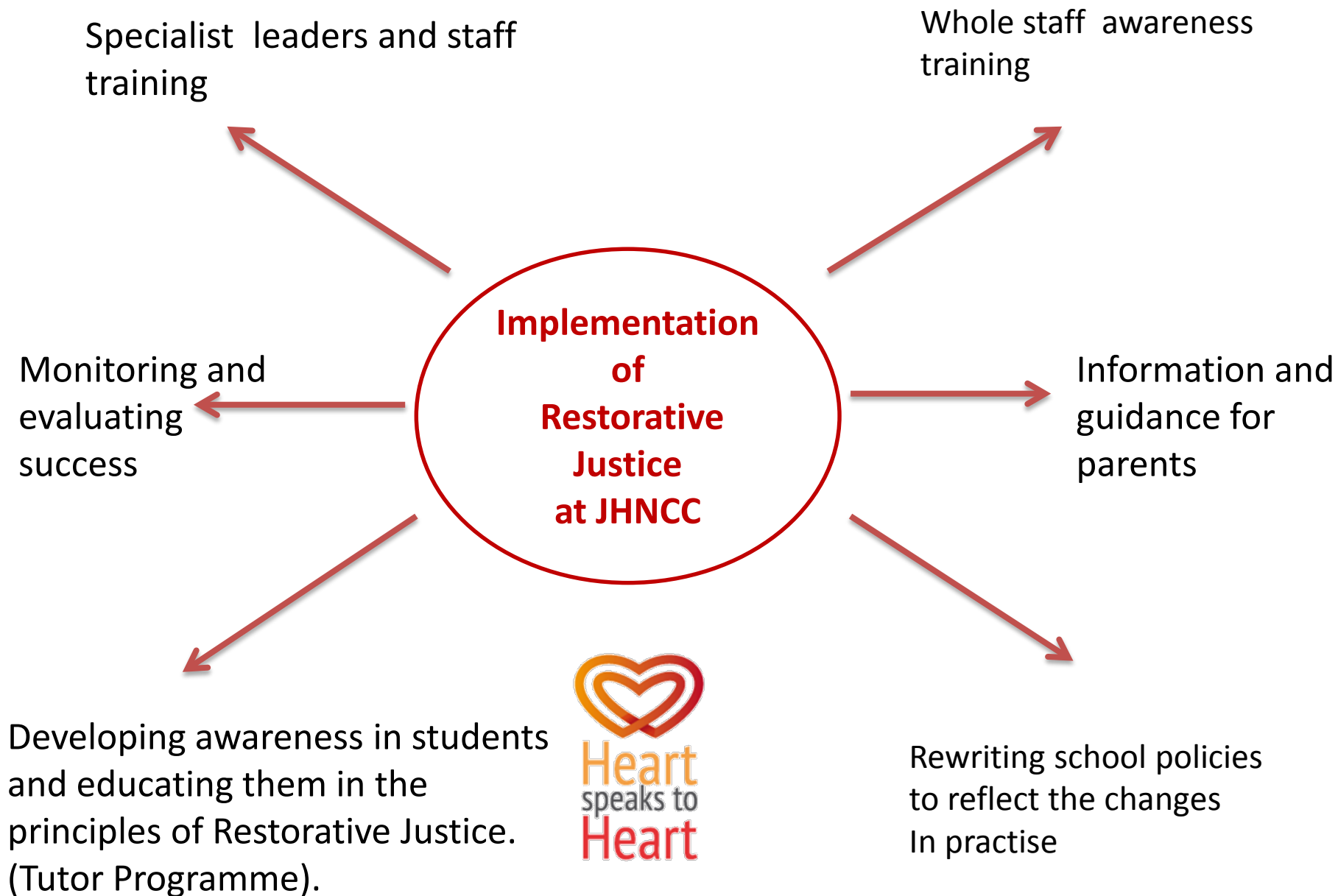

Questions to help those affected:

- What did you think when you realized what had happened?
- What impact has this incident had on you and others?
- What has been the hardest thing for you?
- What do you think needs to happen to make things right?

Character Education

Project-based activities for tutor time

A four-five week programme that is project based and aims at experiencing and embedding the John Henry Newman 'Heart' values.

Each programme is to include the following:

- Learning about something new
- Deepening understanding
- Discussing and sharing ideas
- Debating
- Presentation skills
- Carrying out an activity; active participation
- Reviewing
- Prayer

Each programme will provide for opportunities to build trust and address issues in a restorative circle.



Last week we focussed on Holiness and Empathy. Today we are going to look at the meaning of 'Altruism'.



Altruism



The principle or practice of unselfish concern for or devotion to the welfare of others. Altruism is promoting someone else's welfare, even at a risk or cost to ourselves.



When you give presents at Christmas or for a birthday, is it because you think you OUGHT to, or because you want a present in return?

Or do you give to genuinely make the other person happy?





Watch this clip from the Hunger Games. If you are not aware of the story, in what was once North America, the Capitol of Panem keeps its hold on its 12 districts by forcing them each to select a boy and a girl, called Tributes, to compete in a nationally televised event called the Hunger Games. Every citizen must watch as the youths fight to the death until only one remains. In this clip, The main character - Katniss Everdeen acts in an 'altruistic' way.
